# From the Pastor's Desk

If I looked for a pen to write a note or do homework the pen had the word THINK on it. A pencil the same thing – THINK. Often the little pocket-sized notebook on which the errand list or note was written had THINK on its cover. That was the house I grew up in. And it was the same in neighbors' houses as well. All sorts of everyday items with THINK written somewhere on them. My dad, you see, and many neighbors, worked for IBM and IBM's motto was THINK. It was IBM's mission statement in the workplace as well and I believe they flooded the desks with the THINK paraphernalia and wanted it to go into people's homes. IBM employees were encouraged to THINK: think outside the box, think together, think in the bathroom, think in the cafeteria, and think on the commute home. THINK. Brilliant.

In the hypercompetitive athletic shoe industry, when Nike was looking for an edge, they brilliantly aimed for simplicity. They made an icon, the swoosh, and a memorable slogan – JUST DO IT. Easily the most recognizable symbol in sports merchandise is the Nike swoosh. In the Packers' Museum at Lambeau, one finds one of the original drawings of the iconic Green Bay G. It was carefully crafted to follow the phi ratio, making it pleasant to the eye, while suggesting the shape of a football. Cannot be improved upon. THINK, the swoosh, JUST DO IT, the Packer G. Easily recognizable with a mission statement easily grasped and remembered. It makes me realize that the most successful enterprises in the world keep things simple when it comes to the public perception of who they are. The Ford F, the Chevrolet bowtie, the RCA dog. The internal workings of these companies could be incredibly complex, probably are, but the public's invitation into participating with them is incredibly simple and clear.

I am a middle manager in the oldest continuous organization on the planet – the Church. It is incredibly complex and layered and has survived all the crises of the last 3000 years. It has toppled empires, empowered the rabble, transformed communities and nations, influenced legislation, built hospitals and universities, and brought hope to countless people. What is its symbol? A cross. What is its mission statement? LOVE.

In the French Pyrenees, near the mountainous border with Spain, rests a little village called LeChambon. LeChambon became famous after World War Two when refugee workers realized that a significant number of people were brought to safety through LeChambon and its Protestant Church there. The church hadn't tooted its horn while the war was on, of course, but even when hostilities were over they returned to their everyday lives without even thinking about the thousands they had saved. When sociologists and historians descended on them they were embarrassed and perplexed because they all answered, "What else were we supposed to do?" Chiseled into the limestone that makes the lintel of the door to their humble, centuries-old sanctuary are these words – LOVE ONE ANOTHER. Did centuries of faithful simplicity create a people who humbly cared for vulnerable refugees in the face of barbarous fascism? Probably. Possibly.

LOVE. It's really not that complicated.

### PASTORAL LETTER REGARDING PALESTINE-GAZA-ISRAEL

The situation in Palestine-Gaza-the Holy Land is incredibly layered and complex and centuries old. First of all, in the Middle East, there were no lines and borders until the British Empire, and its overly-developed sense of order, drew them. These lines, putting traditionally fluid people within borders, have been a big problem. The British lines also favored a few special families that created the fertile ground for the incredible wealth gap in the Middle East.

Secondly, in 1947 the United Nations overwhelmingly voted to create the nation of Israel because of Israel's incredibly long history of being a persecuted minority, and guilt over the Holocaust. The land that the UN ceded to Israel was called Palestine. The Palestinians were pawns in a game they did not invent and were relocated to the Gaza Strip. On the first days of its official existence in 1948, the new Israel was attacked on all sides by Arab forces from numerous countries. The Israelis won handily and expanded their borders.

The Arabs attacked several more times over the years, 1956, 1967, 1973, and 1982, and each time Israel expanded its territory – with the exception of 1973 in which both sides had gains and losses. With the advances in weaponry, Israel felt it needed a larger area to keep rockets from reaching Jerusalem and Tel Aviv.

During all of this, the average Palestinians were displaced but none of the Arab nations would absorb them. This violated the strict Muslim code of hospitality toward all Muslims but the code was ignored for a couple of reasons. One, wealthy families did not want their wealth being used to house lessers. Two, the Arab leadership wanted the total disappearance of Israel, and the Palestinian refugee camps were prime grounds for growing terrorists and fighters.

The group that killed 1300 civilians a couple of weeks ago is Hamas and Hamas is funded by wealthy Arabs abroad. Hamas is similar to ISIS and the average Palestinian loathes them. The average Palestinian and the average Israeli favor a two-country solution or a peaceful coexistence. It is only the militant, religious nuts on both sides, who are the minority, who keep the conflict going.

Does Israel have a right to have a country where it is safe for them to live? Absolutely.

Does the legitimate rage felt by the Palestinians at their enforced poverty justify gunning down 1300 civilians? Absolutely not.

Are the Palestinian refugees being bombed out of camps and forced onto the road responsible for the attacks on the civilians? Absolutely not.

Can the massacre of 1300 people in Israel and the kidnapping of dozens be forgiven? Would you? Clear heads need to say that both the Palestinians and the Israelis have a right to exist and to thrive. Until that is said, and until moderation prevails, the tragedy will just keep having more chapters added to it.

### **Operation Christmas 2023**

OPERATION CHRISTMAS 2023 is underway once again this year. First Lutheran Church along with United Methodist Church and Ascension Episcopal Church will be working together to help make a blessed Christmas for 210 families again this year. Each family will receive the following: a tote/basket filled with nonperishable food items like peanut butter, cereal, etc.; a holiday pie, fudge, a ham, a bag of potatoes and carrots, frozen hamburger, coupons for milk and eggs, and fresh fruit (apples, oranges, and bananas.). In addition, each child in the family is provided a gift. This is truly a blessed Christmas for those who receive these baskets.

We will still be providing cookies for shut-ins. Cookies can be dropped off at church on Sunday, December 17th. No nuts and please follow good hygiene practices.

We will begin taking telephone calls and completing request forms for food boxes November 20th and the last day to take requests is December 6th. Call center hours are 8:30 AM – 4:00 PM Monday through Friday. Call 715-634-2141. Distribution this year will again be curbside: Friday, December 15th, 10:00 AM – 6:00 PM and Saturday, December 16th, 10:00 AM – 3:00 PM.

Since we are able to purchase food through Feed My People at a much lower price, we are asking you to consider a monetary donation to be used to purchase the food items for the baskets.

The Operation Christmas Bulletin Board will be in the First Lutheran Church narthex. It will have red and green tree tags for the gifts for the children (\$15-\$20 each) through grade 12.

Please take the tags, purchase, and wrap the gifts, and tape the tags back on the gift. Alternatively, we will be happy to mail trees to anyone who wants to save a trip into town to pick them up – just call First Lutheran during call center operation hours and they will be sent to you. Monetary donations are always welcome (let us do your shopping for you). Gifts can then be placed in the designated box in the narthex. Because of size variation, clothes are not recommended. Gift cards are a great idea for teens.

# CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILY MINISTRIES


### Did you know?


