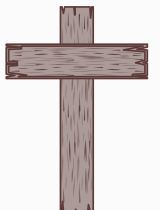

Long Range Planning

This past January, a new round of long-range planning was kicked off by the First Lutheran church council. Several brainstorming sessions were held for the purpose of identifying the needs of the church, as well as initiatives which could advance our mission of being Christ's hands and feet.

Approximately 40 ideas were referred to the second round of reconciliation meetings, where members were asked to explain/defend their ideas/suggestions. Following these meetings, long-range planning (LRP) team leaders sorted and grouped common suggestions/ideas under titles linked to our respective church committees.

LRP team leaders developed a descriptive booklet, providing an overview of the discussions relating to each of the suggestions from both the brainstorming and reconciliation sessions.

Members will vote on Sunday, July 20, to choose the initiatives they will recommend advancing to the church council for placement in the 1-5-10 year planning process.

Children, Youth, and Family Ministries

Thank you, faithful people of First Lutheran! Your volunteer generosity gave first-hand opportunity for your faith to stick on our kids as they learned and were loved and affirmed by you. Your financial generosity sent 25 kids to Bible Camp this summer (to the tune of \$10,350). With grateful hearts, our young families and I shout out to you and God, THANK YOU!

The mission-focused curriculum we used in Confirmation this past year received good reviews from participating small group leaders as well as the students themselves. Our year of Confirmation was anchored and guided by these words that we chanted weekly:

MY ANCHOR

Because I am loved by God
Because I am equipped by God
I can be Jesus' hands and feet
in my everyday life.
I can be Jesus' ears and voice
in my everyday life.
I AM loved by God!
I AM equipped by God!

At year-end, the students were asked what part of our anchor they best connected with in their everyday life because. Here are some of their responses:

- I have everything I need. Because it makes me feel like I don't need the newest baseball gear.
- I AM loved by God! Because it reminds me God will forgive me and always love me no matter what! Because whenever I feel down, I tell myself this.
- Because I am loved by God. Because it reminds me that he loves me and knows that I can accomplish anything, which helps me feel better about myself.
- I can be Jesus' hands and feet in my everyday life. Because I am loved and equipped by God.
- God. I think about him almost every day, and he helps me along the way, and I just know he is there.
- To love my neighbor as myself. Because I always help people by giving them a shoulder to cry on or helping them work through something.

Last October, we confirmed six youth, and this October we will confirm seven. These maturing Christ-followers are asking, "What's next?" As part-time Children, Youth & Family Coordinator, Council Personnel and I are working to find someone else to lead Terrific Tuesday, so I have time to coordinate High School Ministry. (Or we are open to another solution.) Your prayers are requested and appreciated.

Committee Reports

Memorial & Endowment Committee

As stewards of the gifts given in memory and legacy, the Memorial and Endowment Committee has been blessed to oversee the careful and purposeful use of these funds throughout the past year. We are deeply grateful for the generosity of those who have contributed to the Memorial and Endowment Fund, helping ensure that the mission and ministry of First Lutheran Church continue to thrive for generations to come.

Purpose of the Fund

The Memorial and Endowment Fund exists to support ministry opportunities that fall outside the scope of the church's regular operating budget. These are gifts intended to leave a lasting impact—providing for new ministries, strengthening existing programs, enhancing our worship and facilities, and supporting outreach both locally and globally.

2024 Highlights of Spending

Over the past year, the committee prayerfully approved several disbursements that reflect our church's values of worship, community, and service. Key areas of spending included:

***Worship Enhancements:**

A portion of the fund was used to upgrade video equipment, purchase sanctuary banner sets for Christmas and Easter, and replace two hand chimes, enriching our worship experience for both in-person and online services.

***Scholarships and Education:**

We continued supporting students pursuing advanced education and youth attending Camp WAPO in the summer of 2025.

***Mission & Outreach:**

Grants were given to local and global mission partners: Northwoods Community Food Pantry, Stone Lake Food Distributors, ELCA World Hunger, Quilt of Valor, Global Refuge, and ELCA Federal Chaplaincy Ministries, Lutheran Campus Ministry, helping expand our church's reach and support those in need beyond our walls.

***Facilities & Improvements:**

Memorial funds contributed to necessary building updates, including furnishing the Community Room and the Gathering Room, ensuring our church home remains welcoming to all.

***Social Concerns:**

We supported several community programs: Jaeckel & Sheehan ALS Walk, Operation Christmas, Relay for Life Sawyer County-Night for a Cure Event, and Glut 1 Foundation.

Looking Ahead

As we move forward into 2025, the Memorial and Endowment Committee remains committed to honoring the intent of each gift and prayerfully discerning the best uses for these resources. We invite all members to consider how they might contribute to the ongoing legacy of First Lutheran Church, whether through memorial gifts, bequests, or designated giving.

We would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to Dave Napieralski for his three years of dedication and service to the committee. Many projects and organizations were funded with his help and guidance, including reviewing the bylaws. Newly appointed are Kathy McCoy, Tammy Vergeront, and Lori Clifford.

Operation Christmas

Over 50 years ago, around 1970, First Lutheran Church Women worked with local teachers and social service agencies to gather names of families that could use some extra help during the holidays by putting together boxes of food. These were then delivered directly to about 35 family homes as a surprise. Later arrangements were made for the Sheriff's Department to deliver the food boxes. Fast forward to 2024 -the program provided Christmas to 234 families who picked up their food boxes jammed with food, along with a gift for each child (535 children). We are blessed to partner with two other local churches -Hayward United Methodist and Ascension Episcopal Church to cosponsor this outreach along with several local sponsoring organizations. Operation Christmas continues to receive names from local area schools and social service agencies. We also receive names from families or their friends through our phone call center. Each family receives a basket overflowing with non-perishable items like peanut butter and cereal, a pie, fudge, meat, bags of potatoes, carrots, coupons for milk and eggs, and fresh fruit. These provide all the ingredients for Christmas dinner and several additional meals over the Holidays -along with a gift for every child.

Looking forward, we plan to continue to expand along with the Community and the needs of the people in our area. Our goal for 2025 is to provide a blessed Christmas to 240 area families.

The generosity of the members of 1st Lutheran Church has been a mainstay of this program for the past 50-plus years, and I'm confident it will continue to be so for another 50-plus years. Thank you to everyone who participated in this outreach program -looking forward to 2025.

Committee Reports

Property Committee

This past year was a little less hectic for the property committee, with no major projects or problems to be concerned with. As usual, we addressed a number of ongoing maintenance issues that always come up with any older building. We are fortunate to have many willing volunteers who help out regularly.

We continued to work with the Beautification Committee in revamping several rooms within the church. Work on the old library, which is now considered the Community Room, was started the previous year, but this past year saw additional work. The old wallpaper was removed, then the walls were patched, primed, and painted. The Beautification Committee purchased new cabinets; after they were installed, we finished up installing baseboard and patching up a couple of spots on the floor with leftover vinyl plank.

The room next to the choir room was also addressed. All the old furnishings were removed, including an old fireproof cabinet. The old carpet was pulled up, the walls were patched and painted, and the ceiling was painted. Since we sorely needed new carpeting in the choir room also, we had both rooms carpeted at the same time, with the same pattern as that in Pastor Joel's office. The Beautification Committee also provided some new furniture for what is now called the Gathering Room.

Our committee had some discussions with the task force working on the updated long-range plan and identified some items that we thought should be included. No action will be taken on those items until we see how they come out in terms of priorities.

Stewardship Committee

The First Lutheran Stewardship Committee has met on three separate occasions during the first quarter of the year and has created a "stewardship action plan" to be implemented throughout the year. Tenets of this plan include:

- o Defining and emphasizing the importance of stewardship through a series of temple talks from various congregational members.
- o Placing monthly stewardship messages in the weekly church bulletin
- o Emailing occasional stewardship-related messages to congregational members
- o Posting stewardship informational pieces on the church website and Facebook page
- o Determining a new stewardship theme for the year
- o Creating a new stewardship banner for the church narthex

Evangelical Committee

This spring, we were blessed to welcome 15 new families to our congregation. Each family received a First Lutheran tote that included: the Church directory and supplement, the Digital Resources sheet, the First Lutheran Church Ministry Contact sheet, First Lutheran Welcomes You booklet, a sheet containing volunteer opportunities within our church, and their name tags.

We also worked with Sue Reinardy to update the ministry contact information on our website, ensuring easier communication and access for all our members.

Task Force Reports

Columbarium/Memorial Wall Task Force

This past year was fairly quiet and not as eventful as previous years. We sold and put up more memory wall plaques, but did not have any more niche sales. We received state certification in January of this year on the columbarium policies. Benches and a sculpture were added last summer, and more flowers and shrubs have been added. We had a required annual meeting of niche owners in June, as well as a celebration of our first anniversary after the columbarium was dedicated. Our first inurnment ceremony was held on June 30th of this year.

Social Media Task Force

First Lutheran's online presence continues to increase with postings on Facebook and Instagram along with our website, <http://www.flchaywardwi.org>

Facebook - We currently have 789 Facebook followers (up 12% over the previous year) who regularly enjoy daily devotions by Pastor Joel, our weekly worship service, special programs, and posts showing the various ministries and activities of our church. In the last 12 months, we had over 250,000 Facebook views.

Website - Our website had almost 3,700 users in the last 12 months, viewing 18,000 pages, with archived worship videos being the most popular webpage. A reformatted website was launched in August 2024, providing improved navigation.

AV Task Force

The final planned update to the First Lutheran Video broadcast system was installed in early June. We now have five cameras plus one remote camera available to deliver church events, activities, and services to members and guests unable to participate locally. During the past few months, we have been averaging close to 1750 devices viewing services, morning devotions, and events per week. Our largest viewership occurs when we have a youth-focused event, with nearly 800 views for a Sunday youth service! We now have three members who are trained to run the system. The women of Peace Circle meet on the second Tuesday of each month in the church lounge at 10 am. We use the Bible study found in the monthly "Gather" magazine of Women of the ELCA. Copies of the Bible study are available for those who attend. All are welcome to join us for coffee, treats, fellowship and Bible study!

Altar Guild

The Altar Guild is a lay ministry serving God by preparing the Sanctuary for worship, as well as maintaining and caring for the sacred vessels. We change the paraments and set up the altar for worship, funerals, weddings, and baptisms. On Saturday mornings, we get ready for the worship services by checking the candles for oil, light dusting, vacuuming around the altar, and getting the communion vessels set up. Depending on the liturgical calendar, the paraments may need to be changed. Prior to, and immediately following each service, we have a few duties to complete, none of which takes much time, especially since there are usually other Altar Guild members to help with this. Every month, an email is sent out asking for volunteers. At least one person for the weekly set-up and one for each service is needed. Cover Girls

Cover Girls was started in April 1972 and has been going on ever since (53 Years). It is a small group of women who meet twice a month, the 2nd and 3rd Thursday of the month, in the morning to make quilts. These quilts are not fancy but easy-to-make tie quilts.

Thank you to the many people who have donated washable material, sheets, curtains (no white), and crocheting yarn. Anyone can tie a quilt. You just have to know how to tie a knot.

If you can join us, these are some of the things that we do:

Sort, cut, and iron material, tie quilts and baby blankets, sew the tops of quilts, lay out material, and cut up scraps used to stuff bed pads for dogs and cats, at the Northwood's Animal Shelter.

There is something to do for anyone who comes to help. Learn how simple our quilts are. Our quilts go to graduating seniors, some stay here to help our families, and most go to Lutheran World Relief, which then sends them all over the world. This year, some went to flood victims and people who lost their homes in the LA fires. We made 94 quilts this year. We also make 39 baby quilts and 12 nursing covers, which go to the hospital or Tamarack Family clinic for expecting parents. In addition, we put together 14 dog/cat beds.

Women of First Lutheran

The mission statement of the Women of the ELCA is "mobilize women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ". As women of First Lutheran, we continue to grow in our faith through opportunities for worship, Bible study, volunteering, and missions.

First Lutheran Women have three circles: Peace, Faith, Hope, and Love, and Jubilee.

All three circles meet monthly for fellowship and study at First Lutheran Church at different times. The circles use the Gather Magazine and other resources for their monthly Bible studies. Please check the calendar for dates and times for each circle.

Koinonia (Meaning Christian fellowship and communion) meets weekly at church on Tuesday mornings at 8:00 am. The Koinonia group is currently engaged in a book study, highlighting the many churches of the world.

Throughout this exploration, they are learning about traditions and customs and comparing these to their faith journey at First Lutheran Church.

Several other opportunities for women to serve are: Purls of Prayer, Card Ladies, Cover Girls, Altar Guild, and Funeral Services.

Recipients of the quilts made by the Cover Girls this year included graduating high school seniors, families within the community, and Lutheran World Relief.

The Purls of Prayer ladies use their knitting talents to create prayer shawls, prayer patches and hats, and mittens for Operation Christmas.

Our Card Ladies use recycled cards to create new cards for any occasion, which are displayed for purchase in the narthex.

Altar Guild is a group of dedicated ladies who prepare the church for worship, funerals, weddings, and baptisms.

The Thankoffering Church Service, is an annual service, led by the women of First Lutheran and was held this year on the weekend of October 5th and 6th. This church service tradition sets aside offerings in thankfulness for the blessings received. The Saturday and Sunday services raised \$750.00 which was in addition to the weekly church offering. This special offering assists the many ways the women of First Lutheran support those around them.

On November 1, 2024, the annual Scandinavian Dinner and Bake Sale was held under the dedicated leadership of Kris Treland-Neumann and members of First Lutheran.

The annual meeting of the FLCW was held on January 18, 2025.

A soup and sandwich luncheon was provided to the women attending the annual meeting. Women were invited to bring their baby pictures. Gwen Mickelson designed a tabletop gallery walk depicting each decade. Women placed their pictures on the table accordingly, based on the decade when they were born. We enjoyed a walk down memory lane and the beautiful photography of a bygone era.
